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ACADEMIC CALENDAR:

Fall

1st Bachelor year: Block 1 (Aug-Oct) and 2 (Oct-Dec) 2nd Bachelor year: Block 5 (Aug-Oct) and 6 (Oct-Dec) 3rd Bachelor year: Block 9 (Aug-Nov) and 10 (Nov-Dec)

In general exams are scheduled the week after or at the end of each block. Most re-sits, however, take place in January (block 5), February (block 2 and 10), March (block 6), July (block 9).

Spring

1st Bachelor year: block 3 (mid Jan- end March) and block 4 (early April - end May) 2nd Bachelor year: block 7 (mid-Jan – mid-March) and block 8 (early April - early June) 3rd Bachelor year: block 11 (early Jan – mid-Feb), block 12 (end Feb – end March), block 13 (early April – mid-May), block 14 (mid-May – end June)

In general exams are scheduled the week after or at the end of each block. Re-sits, however, take place end of March - early April (block 3A & 11), mid-May (block 12), mid-June - end of June (block 3B), end of June (block 7 & 13), early July/mid-July (block 4, 8 & 14).

| LEARNING EXPECTATIONS: | |
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| Teaching Language | English |
| Duration | Students are expected to complete their entire exchange programme at RSM including final exams. Neither exemptions nor special arrangements with teaching staff can be made to schedule exams or re-sits on other dates, times, or places. |
| Introduction | At the start of each full-term programme, introduction activities are being organized. Exchange students are strongly recommended to participate in order not to miss out on important programme information and it is THE day to meet all fellow students. |
| Workload | Courses are denominated in EC (European Credits). The workload of one academic year is 60 EC. One EC is the equivalent of 28 hours (including in-class hours, self-study, group work, writing papers and exam preparation). A 10 EC course has approximately 12 contact hours a week. For exchange students, the minimum workload is 20 EC for the fall term and 30 EC for the spring term and a maximum of 30 EC for the fall term and 40 EC for the spring term applies. |
| Examinations | The assessment of the performance of students varies; written or take-home exams, progress reports, in-class presentations, group performance and essays. |
| Grading | The Dutch grading system uses grades 1 to 10, with 1 being the lowest and 10 the highest. Grades are generally given to one decimal place. Grades with a 0.4 or lower will be rounded down, and grades with a 0.5 or more will be rounded up. Transcripts from students in our exchange programmes will show grades to 1 decimal place. | CURRICULUM: | |
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| Courses at RSM | Undergraduate students from our partner schools participate in our Bachelor Exchange Programme and moreover in courses from our 3-year BSc International Business Administration (IBA) programme. All courses are taught in English and the curriculum offers a broad approach and options for differentiation, covering all functional areas of business. |
| Course overview Bachelor 1, 2 & 3 | On this page an overview of bachelor 1, 2 and 3rd year courses are given. The majority of these courses are open to exchange students. |
| Course manuals | Course manuals are published about two weeks prior to the start of the courses. |
| International Business: The Dutch Way | This course has been specially designed for exchange students to introduce them to the Dutch business environment and its economic and cultural settings. Economic analyses are examined and discussed in the context of European and Dutch cultures. Special attention is given to recent developments in large international companies located in the Netherlands. Students will become familiar with several Dutch companies, each showing a different aspect of doing international business in the Netherlands and will work on assignments for each one. Company visits, assignments in the form of business challenges and linked to guest lectures will be part of this course. This course is offered in spring term only. |
| Course enrollment | Upon nomination by their home university, students will receive all practical information and instructions on how/ when to enroll for courses by email. |
| Courses at other faculties | Only a few other schools/courses are open to exchange students. Every school has its own course registration procedure and deadline, it is therefore the student's own responsibility to register in time for courses and avoid overlap in the timetable of RSM. | ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS | |
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| Open to | Third-or fourth year bachelor level students who are studying at our BSc partner schools and who are selected by their home university. |
| English requirement | TOEFL iBT 80+ (minimum subscore of 18 for reading & listening, and 20 for speaking and 21 for writing). IELTS 6.5 (minimum subscore of 6.0 for reading, listening, speaking, and writing). TOEIC 800+ (listening & reading) AND 320+ (speaking & writing). CEFR level B2. Cambridge FCE/CAE/CPE/BEC Higher 170 (minimum subscore of 170 for reading, listening, speaking & writing). Or another English language certificate of a comparable level. No statements from universities are accepted anymore. |
| English exemption | Non-native English speakers whose current study programme is completely taught in English are exempted, though proof needs to be provided. |
| After nomination at RSM | About a month prior to the student's application deadline, nominated students will receive a Welcome Email with instructions for the online application system, information about visa and residence permit (if applicable), accommodation, academic calendar, and other relevant information to help them prepare. Before the first course application/registration starts, we will provide an online Q&A session. |
| Deadline application | It is the student's own responsibility to submit the exchange application in time. Fall: May 15 Spring: October 15 Late applications will not be dealt with unless agreed upon with the partner school. |
| Required documents | Completed RSM online application 1 digital passport size photo (jpg file) Scan of personal details page of passport Scan of a recent official transcript (or academic report) showing grades, from the first year to the latest results Proof of proficiency in English |
| Information during and after the application process | Students can check their status in the online application system. Upon approval of the application, students will receive at least 2 other email messages: 1) One with information on the course registration including specific information about the courses, timetables, etc. 2) The other with more detailed information on the introduction, arrival in the Netherlands, the Exchange Ambassador Programme, which is also referred to as the 'final Information email'. The Letter of Acceptance is sent to students through the online application system. |
| Visa/residence permit | The Exchange Office will check whether a student needs to apply for a visa and/or residence permit. If applicable, the student will be informed and directed to all instructions as mentioned on our webpage: <u>Immigration</u> . Visa requirements are subject to change. Always check: <u>Visa</u> |

| Costs of living | The estimated costs for a period of 4 months are approximately \in 6,000. These costs |
